God is not our waiter; we are His servants. He sets opportunities and responsibilities before us, and we do them without worrying about thanks or rewards.

Since God created this world, this universe, and gave us life, He owns everything. When we give up something for His kingdom's work, we are only giving back to Him what He already owns.
